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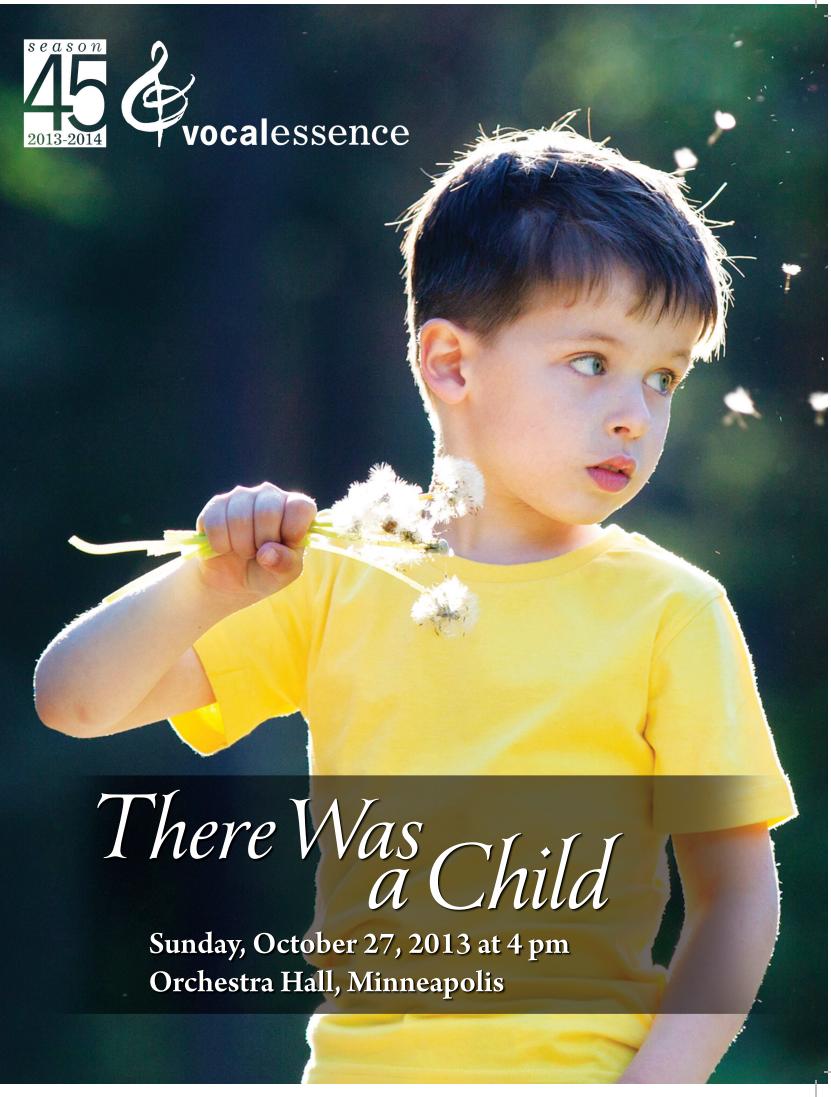

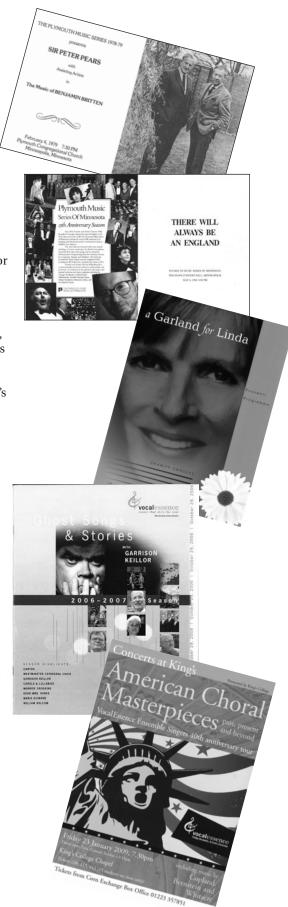

## **Program Notes**

**Glorious Majesty,** Aaron Jay Kernis *World Premiere* 

Psalm 104 is a voluminous text filled to overflowing with the glories of creation, earth and of the heavens. It begins and ends with God in the Universe, then describes the creation of the heavens, nature, the creatures of the earth and humankind. It celebrates our sacred relationship to the Divine and all life on Earth, closing with praise for God and all of life.

It was a challenge to compress this text for this piece, but I tried to keep the entirety of it in mind while choosing the sections I found most evocative for a choral setting. Contrasting sections with large and small groups of singers heighten the alternation between praise of God and of God's creation.

It looks for balance between the harmonically stable and wayward—often shifting mode suddenly, then returning to calmer harmonies that show roots in early church music. This version of Psalm 104 comes from the 1535 edition of Miles Coverdale in a modernization from 2000 by William S. Peterson.

I am thrilled that Philip Brunelle and the Ensemble Singers are giving the world premiere of this work in Minneapolis, my longtime second musical home. I have enjoyed such a fruitful and warm relationship with them over the years, and am delighted to be back with them today.

Glorious Majesty was generously commissioned by Soli Deo Gloria, as part of their Psalms Project, made possible by a grant from Lilly Endowment Inc. At the heart of Soli Deo Gloria's mission is the commissioning of new sacred music from the world's leading composers, and in addition sponsors sacred music concerts and recordings around the world.

Glorious Majesty was composed in honor, and in loving memory of Anita Nelson.

## Hymns for the Amusement of Children, Conrad Susa

Christopher Smart wrote his *Hymns for the Amusement of Children* in 1771, the last year of his life, while he was in debtor's prison. No stranger to prisons and mental institutions, he seems to have be afflicted with a sort of religious mania which some of his detractors considered to be madness. Boswell records Dr. Johnson as saying, "Madness frequently discovers itself merely by unnecessary deviation from the usual modes of the world. My poor friend Smart showed the disturbance of his mind by falling on his knees and saying his prayers in the street, or any other unusual place. Now although, rationally speaking, it is greater madness not to pray at all than to pray as Smart did, I am afraid there are so many who do not pray, that their understanding is not called into question."

Smart's collection consists of thirty-six hymns, together with three unnumbered hymns as a tailpiece. The poems are dedicated to His Highness Prince Frederick, the second son of George III, and "composed for his amusement ... with all due submission and respect [and] humbly ascribed to him as the best of Bishops." The frontispiece to the collection shows the Prince as a bishop, aged seven, having held his See since he was six months old.

Lighter and more accessible than Smart's best poems (*Jubilate Agno and Hymn to David*, familiar in the setting by Benjamin Britten), the *Hymns for the Amusement of Children* were meant to instruct through entertainment.

Having decided the Hymns were already sufficiently instructive, I chose to emphasize their more amusing aspects by locating Smart's sensibility with the American popular music forms and singing styles, as follows:

- 1. For Sunday, in calypso style as if for Harry Belafonte
- 2. At Dressing in the Morning, modeled after (and for) Elton John
- 3. *Against Despair*, in a flowing folksong style (with a tango thrown in) as if for Judy Collins; a brief piano cadenza leads directly to
- 4. *For Saturday,* a sort of "Carnival in Rio" that Louis Armstrong might have sung;
- 5. At Undressing in the Evening, moody blues suitable for, say, Al Green or Johnny Mathis;
- 6. The Conclusion of the Matter, as if for Roberta Flack or Barbara Streisand.

In addition to the toying with the singing styles and dance forms, the Hymns in the cycle are arranged to form a rudimentary plot: the first and last Hymns are sung by a parent, while the inner group is sung by the child. The whole set, like the classical sets of six (which commemorate the six days of Creation, Wednesday being the piano cadenza) spans a week in the child's life and symbolizes the span of one's whole life.

## **There Was a Child,** Jonathan Dove

 $U.S.\ Premiere$ 

From an early age music gave my life meaning, especially choral music, so commissioning a piece to celebrate my son Robert's life seemed an obvious thing to do—if a bit rash! I worked in music and knew it was possible. Jonathan Dove was the obvious choice of composer for me, I was first struck by hearing his music in the theatre years ago and subsequently worked with him on his first concerto commission. His strong feeling for community connected with my need for the piece to be universal. Robert's father, Richard Van Allan, was rehearsing Jonathan's first main-stage opera, *Flight*, at Glyndebourne in the summer of 1999.

Robert, aged 19, drowned while snorkelling in Thailand on June 21st 1999. Jonathan never knew him but we spent much time talking about him and *There was a Child* has surpassed all my expectations. Jonathan has completely captured Robert's spirit

in this modern oratorio which traces a young life, from birth through childhood to young manhood, through a sequence of poems. Robert was a thoughtful, warm, happy, fun-loving, fearless person with great compassion and love of mankind; he grabbed every opportunity that came his way and his adventurous spirit has inspired all of us who knew and loved him—he would have been delighted to have had such a joyous piece of music written to celebrate his life and the lives of all young people taken from us too soon.

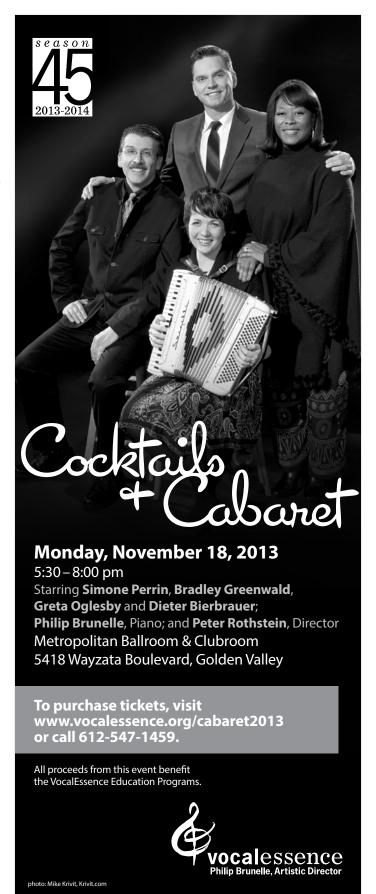

When Rosemary Pickering asked me to write a piece to celebrate the life of her son, I think we both immediately felt it should involve singing. Singing with other people is one of the most joyful activities I know, so this had to be a choral work. And music celebrating young life should include the sound of children's voices. The idea of mother and son suggested two soloists, soprano and tenor. Accompanying these different voices would be all the colours of the symphony orchestra. The Norfolk and Norwich Festival and the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra joined in this commission to create a large-scale piece of communal music-making.

I started looking for words for all these voices to sing. I found poems by Charles Causley and Langston Hughes describing the wonder of birth; by Wordsworth, Keats, Traherne and Emily Dickinson conjuring up different aspects of childhood—naughtiness, carefree playfulness, youthful adventures. My choices were informed by stories Rosie and Richard had told me about their son Robert—absolutely particular stories about a unique individual, but which also conjured up archetypal images of youthful liveliness, mischief and outdoor escapades.

Most of the texts are celebratory, but there is no avoiding the terrible moment when a young life is cut short in the midst of adventure. Shakespeare evokes the grief of a mother for her child and Tichborne sings of death coming too soon. I didn't want the piece to end here, and it was important to Rosie to remember all the joy her son's short life brought her. Walt Whitman's poem *There was a Child went Forth* is a radiant vision of a child absorbing everything around him and connecting with the whole world.

## **Biographies**



Jonathan Dove was born in London, the son of architects, and was playing the organ in his local parish church by the age of 12. Dove's early musical experiences came from playing

the piano, organ and viola. He studied composition with Robin Holloway at Cambridge. During his formative years, Dove got to know singers and the complex mechanics of the opera house through playing for rehearsals and devising outreach projects for large- and small-scale opera companies.

Dove's straightforward, essentially diatonic, musical language is especially well suited to choral music and he has composed several popular anthems as well as the large-scale cantata The Passing of the Year (2000). In 2009, The Minnesota Opera hosted the American premiere of Dove's opera Pinocchio. Other works include a number of anthems including: "I am the day", "Bless the Lord", "O My Soul", "The Star Song" (dedicated to long-time VocalEssence patron John Bjorklund), and "I will lift up mine eyes". His carol, "The Three Kings", was commissioned for the famous Nine Lessons and Carols service at King's College Cambridge on Christmas Eve 2000, and VocalEssence performed it for *Welcome* Christmas in 2003.

Wuorinen. His style

has a transparency and emotional eloquence, a truly eclectic musical language that incorporates the influences of Latin rhythms, jazz and rap as well as the harmonic worlds of the Romantic masters, the Renaissance and Hildegard von Bingen. One of the youngest composers ever to be awarded the

Pulitzer Prize in Music, Kernis won in 1998 for his String Quartet No. 2, *musica instrumentalis*, which was commissioned and premiered by the Lark Quartet. VocalEssence commissioned "The Love of God"; a work that has been performed in numerous concerts both in the USA and England. Kernis has enjoyed a close association with the Minnesota Orchestra since 1992, and was the founder and director of its annual Composer Institute.



Conrad Susa was for many years resident composer for the Old Globe Theatre in San Diego and served as dramaturge for the O'Neill Center in Connecticut. He has written

numerous scores for documentary films and PBS television productions, choral and instrumental works and operas (Transformations, Black River, The Dangerous Liaisons and The Love of Don Perlimplín) commissioned by the Minnesota Opera Company, San Francisco Opera and Pepsico and a church opera (The Wise Women) for the American Guild of Organists. He has won numerous awards, including Ford Foundation fellowships, National Endowment for the Arts grants and a National Endowment Consortium grant. Susa is on the faculty of the San Francisco Conservatory of Music and was commissioned by VocalEssence for his Christmas bestseller,"Carols and Lullabies", recorded by the Ensemble Singers in 2004. VocalEssence has performed many of his choral works over the years.

Chamber Symphony, Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, Minnesota Orchestra and many others. She has been a regular guest at the Oregon Bach, Victoria Bach and San Luis Obispo Mozart Festivals, the Oregon Festival of American Music, and on Public Radio International's *A Prairie Home Companion*.

Maria has performed more than 45 operatic roles, including the role of "Mrs. Olson" which she created for the May 2002 Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra premiere of Garrison Keillor's operatic excursion, Mr. and Mrs. Olson. Maria performed with VocalEssence for the world premiere of Francis Grier's *The* Passion of Jesus of Nazareth in 2006 and concerts of William Bolcom's music during the *Illuminating Bolcom* festival held in Spring 2007. In 2008-2009, she joined VocalEssence in the 40th Birthday Party celebration hosted by Garrison Keillor and also performed as soprano soloist in the world premiere of Lawrence Siegel's Kaddish. Last year, she performed with VocalEssence in Welcome Christmas.



Tenor **Dan Dressen** is a professor of music at St. Olaf College and Associate Provost of the College. His operatic experience includes roles with Washington Opera, Cleveland Lyric Opera

and The Minnesota Opera, including the world premiere of Ricky Ian Gordon's *The Grapes of Wrath*. He has also performed with The Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, Minnesota Chorale, Dale Warland Singers, and North Star Opera.

Dan has sung with VocalEssence for over twenty-five years and is featured in its recordings of Benjamin Britten's *Paul Bunyan* and Aaron Copland's *The Tender Land*. Dan joined VocalEssence for the world premiere of Francis Grier's *The Passion of Jesus of Nazareth* in 2006 and sang in William Bolcom's *Songs of Innocence and of Experience* in 2007. In 2008, he sang with VocalEssence at the "40th Birthday Party with Garrison Keillor", John Philip Sousa's *El Capitan* in 2010 and *Brits & Brass* in 2012.

## The St. Olaf Choir



The St. Olaf Choir is comprised of 75 mixed voices. For over a century, the choir has set a standard of choral excellence and remained at the forefront of choral artistry. Conducted since 1990 by Anton Armstrong, the St. Olaf Choir continues to develop the tradition that originated with its founder, F. Melius Christiansen started in 1912.

The ensemble's annual tour brings its artistry and message to thousands of people across the nation and around the world. The St. Olaf Choir has taken 14 international tours and performed for capacity audiences in the major concert halls of Norway, France, South Korea, New Zealand, Australia, New York City, Washington, D.C., Chicago, Los Angeles, Dallas, and the Twin Cities. A selection of previous performances with VocalEssence include: "Musique de France" at the Cathedral of St. Paul and WITNESS with André Thomas.

## The Mission of VocalEssence

VocalEssence champions choral music of all genres, celebrating the vocal experience through innovative concerts, commissions, and community engagement programs.

VocalEssence is renowned for its innovative exploration of music for voices and instruments under the enthusiastic direction of Artistic Director and Founder Philip Brunelle. Each season, VocalEssence presents an eclectic series of concerts featuring the 100-voice VocalEssence Chorus, the 32-voice professional Ensemble Singers, and an array of guest soloists and instrumentalists.

VocalEssence was founded in 1969 as the Plymouth Music Series, an arts outreach program of Plymouth Congregational Church in Minneapolis and incorporated as a separate 501(c)(3) non-profit in 1979. In 2002, the Plymouth Music Series changed its name to VocalEssence, capturing the essence of its mission to explore music for the human voice, from the spoken word to choral singing.

In addition to championing lesser-known works of the past, VocalEssence has an unwavering commitment to today's composers, which has resulted in more than 160 world premieres to date. The organization has received the ASCAP/ Chorus America Award for Adventurous Programming of Contemporary Music six times and has been honored with more Chorus America awards than any other ensemble nationwide, including the oncein-an-organizational-lifetime Margaret Hillis Achievement Award for Choral Excellence.

Beyond its work in performances and recordings of choral music, VocalEssence reaches into the community with programs that impact thousands of students, singers and composers every year. WITNESS celebrates the contributions of African Americans to our shared American heritage through concerts, recordings and comprehensive school programs. ¡Cantaré! brings the talents of composers from Mexico directly into Minnesota classrooms. VocalEssence partners with American Composers Forum to offer the annual Welcome Christmas Carol Contest.

## Philip Brunelle

Artistic Director and Founder



Philip Brunelle, artistic director and founder of VocalEssence, is an internationally renowned conductor, choral scholar and performer.

Believing that listeners and musicians alike must experience music of many genres and styles, he has worked enthusiastically—and tirelessly—to expand audiences for rarely heard works of the past and worthwhile new music. In addition, to date VocalEssence has commissioned more than 160 works. Philip has conducted symphonies (New York Philharmonic, Seattle Symphony, and Minnesota Orchestra among others) as well as choral festivals and operas on six continents.

Over the past decade Philip has been deeply involved with the International Federation of Choral Music (IFCM). He served as president of the Sixth World Symposium on Choral Music held in Minneapolis (2002), was on the Artistic Committee for the Eighth Symposium, held in Denmark (2008), and the Ninth Symposium, held in Argentina (2011). He is a Vice President of the IFCM Board and is now serving as Executive Director for the 2014 World Choral Symposium to be held in Seoul, South Korea.

Philip holds five honorary doctorates, was invested as an Honorary Member of the Order from the British Empire (MBE) in 2005 for his services to music, and Commander of the Royal Norwegian Order of Merit in 2007. He has also been honored by the governments of Sweden, Hungary, and Mexico.



Sigrid Johnson Associate Conductor

As the associate conductor of VocalEssence, Sigrid Johnson is affectionately known as "Ears"—for her unique skill in helping develop the choral blend and balance that give the VocalEssence Chorus and Ensemble Singers their signature sound. She provides expert input in the selection of repertoire and assists throughout the audition process. Her ability to achieve excellence in choral blend and intonation is a priceless asset to VocalEssence.

Sigrid is a member of the voice and choral faculty of St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minnesota, and the conductor of the Manitou Singers, St. Olaf's 100-voice first-year women's chorus. She maintains an active schedule as a guest conductor and clinician at choral festivals, workshops and all-state music festivals across the country. She is known internationally for her work with musicians at all levels, having conducted workshops in Australia, the Netherlands, Sweden and Finland. In August 2008, Sigrid was one of the featured lecturers for the Eighth World Symposium on Choral Music in Copenhagen; in 2011, she was featured in the Ninth World Symposium, to be held in Argentina.

Sigrid is active in the American Choral Director's Association, the Music Educator's National Conference, the International Federation for Choral Music, and Chorus America.

Tesfa is active in the American Choral Directors Association, the Music Educator's National Conference, and the National Association of Teachers of Singing.

Tesfa holds a Master of Music degree in Choral Conducting and Vocal Performance from the Florida State University and a Bachelor of Music degree in Vocal Performance from the University of Memphis.

## Charles Kemper Accompanist



Charles Kemper, pianist, has taught at St. Olaf College, Northwestern College and Bethel University, and is currently organist for Calvary Baptist Church in Roseville, MN.

A native of Houston, Texas, Charles made his debut with the Houston Symphony at the age of 17, playing Rachmaninoff's Second Piano Concerto. He has earned several degrees in piano performance, including a doctor of musical arts degree from Yale University. He has appeared as a soloist with the New Haven Symphony, University of Houston Orchestra, Yale Philharmonia, and the Jacksonville Symphony. Charles has been the VocalEssence staff accompanist since 1993.



## VocalEssence Ensemble Singers

Minnesota is home to one of the truly international gems in choral music—the VocalEssence Ensemble Singers. This 32-voice professional chorus is a beloved national treasure that has been enjoyed by millions in Minnesota, around the country, and indeed, around the world.

The Ensemble Singers serve as the core of the larger VocalEssence Chorus, and returning members of the Ensemble Singers audition every year. The Ensemble Singers were featured last November at the 50th Anniversary Celebration of the American Choral Directors Association of Minnesota. In March, they were invited to perform at the National Conference of the American Choral Directors Association in Dallas, Texas, where they received standing ovations for their performances of music by Mexican composers.

## VocalEssence Chorus

The VocalEssence Chorus is an exceptional group of talented, committed singers from many walks of life: doctors, lawyers, nurses, educators, homemakers, business people, and others. Most have college level or higher training in classical music and voice. Chorus auditions are held every spring, and returning members of the Chorus re-audition every two years.
