LESSON 1: "SHOW UP" BY JOE DAVIS: WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO SHOW UP?

Joe Davis's spoken word piece "Show Up" boldly communicates and explores what it means to **show up** for each other. The powerful words convey important messages about caring, supporting, and connecting with people and communities. It clearly connects to the message of the 2023 WITNESS theme of **Reawakening Love**.

"Show Up" was first performed over four years ago. It eventually led to **SHOW UP: The Music Project,** a 5-track EP of original music and poetry from Joe Davis in collaboration with over a dozen artists, activists, and community members. The **SHOW UP Music Project** is about what it means to show up unapologetically, authentically, and fully present in this historic moment.

Students will view a video of a performance, reflect on the meaning of Joe's words through discussion and writing, and create a Graffiti Wall to communicate and express their own thoughts and ideas about **showing up**.

YOU WILL NEED:

- Copies of the **Viewing/Listening Log** worksheet, included with this lesson

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO "SHOW UP?"

STEP 1: Anticipate the message in the poem called "Show Up." Based on the title, ask students to think about and share what the poem will be about.

STEP 2: Read the opening lines out loud. Ask students for additional thoughts about what the poem is expressing.

STEP 3: Before watching the video of "Show Up" featuring Joe Davis and The Poetic Diaspora, distribute copies of the **Viewing/Listening Log** to students. Read the step-by-step directions together. Explain/clarify how to work through the steps and how you will signal them to move on to the next step.

STEP 4: Students will watch and listen to the performance, following the sequence on the **Viewing/Listening Log** worksheet, and write words/short phrases/thoughts to **DESCRIBE** what they see and hear. Take time at the end for students to complete their worksheets.

STEP 5: After listening, have students partner up, share what they wrote, then discuss:

- What message(s) is the poet communicating?
- What words or phrases caught your attention? Do you know why?
- What issues, causes, events, do you think are important enough to show up for?
- Together choose one item from your discussion that you are willing to share in class.

STEP 6: Reconvene as a class and ask the students to share their selected thought, question, or insight.

- While students report out their shared comments, encourage others to listen
 and jot down comments that they found interesting to the question "What
 Does It Mean To SHOW UP?" They will use them for the next activity.
- Finally, read to students (or ask for student reader) what author Joe Davis says about the meaning of "Show Up." (see sidebar)

VIEWING/LISTENING LOG

Watch, Listen, and Describe a Performance



1. <u>Do Not Write</u> for the <u>first minute</u> or so. Just **LISTEN\WATCH** and take it in. Get the feel for the rhythm, words, how the performer says them, and the musical sounds.

2.	ideas, instruments, performers and performance. Include any thoughts that pop into your head about what it means to "Show Up." Keep writing until the end of the video. Details are great!	
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3.	When the video is over, read what you've written. CIRCLE the thoughts, words, ideas that stay with you. What was most interesting, memorable, or important?	
4.	Talk with a partner. Compare notes and discuss your descriptions <i>and</i> any thoughts or insights about the meaning of the poem.	
5.	Together decide on one idea/description/insight you will share with the class.
